

MCC offers peer support for people in the process of 'coming out' and visitation to people in hospitals and prisons etc. MCC will perform holy unionarite of blessing for gay and lesbian couples. If speakers are needed for information about MCC, they can be arranged.

The church has workshops and seminars on religious issues, as well as on issues of homosexuality and Christianity etc. The church can supply resource materials such as pamphlets, bibliographies, types of sermons, video tapes and film lists etc. As well as all of this, the church offers social events such as potluck suppers, picnics and recreational activities.
