

RAISING AWARENESS Picture the inevitable annual employee picnic. You are invited to attend this function and are asked to bring your spouse or a date. No problem-right? Wrong! What are you to do? Should you go alone or graciously decline? You've only missed all of the past five picnics. And just how many more "deaths" can conveniently coincide with the dreaded event. So you decide this year to bring your POSSSSLQ (Person of the same sex sharing same living quarters). You imagine the coronary your boss will likely suffer when you introduce your "friend". In another scenario, you imagine introducing him as your gay lover. It will likely go over about as well as saying your are an Iraqi terrorist. Homophobia. It's too bad Hollywood hasn't considered making a movie of this. It would have a catchy slogan— a person with an attitude. I'll show them attitude. Just go to any gay bar. . .but I digress.

What is it that makes "them" so fearful of "us"? Why is there a "them" and an "us"? In a series of public and classroom forums the issue of being gay, lesbian, or bisexual and what that means in terms of daily living will be discussed early this month. October 9 to 11 has been designated as BGLAD (Bisexual, Gay, and Lesbian Awareness Days) at the University of Guelph. On another equally positive note, I expect that it was no accident that BGLAD should coincide so closely with AIDS Awareness Week (October 15 to 21) officially proclaimed by the Ontario government. It may seem like overkill to some but perhaps that is what "they" need to hear to notice "us". Together, these two events are designed to help raise awareness. On the one hand, a series of discussions are planned which hopefully will dispell some of the myths of homosexuality and bisexuality. Yet on the other hand, some highly entertaining and some very sombre events have been organized to demonstrate that AIDS knows no boundaries. It is a disease that has and will continue to affect us all whether directly or indirectly. Although it is slowly becoming less of a death sentence that it originally was, it still is greatly misunderstood but it is hoped that AAW will help clarify some of these misconceptions.

Of course none of these events will be successful without proper advertising. So if this issue of the newsletter seems especially heavy with listings of scheduled events please bear with us. Raising awareness about our sexuality and that AIDS is a reflection of poorly understood attitudes towards sex, both are issues that are so important they deserve star billing. Besides, some very interesting events are planned so let's show some support and attend them. Perhaps you may even see me during BGLAD in front of a classroom (wondering just what it is I'm doing there). In closing, while it would be too much to hope for that as a result of these events everyone will suddenly become more tolerant to people's differences and less cavalier about acting out their sexual desires, educating even one individual will demonstrate that we made a difference.

MISCELLANEOUS AFFAIRS/EVENTS

GAYCARE In an earlier newsletter (see the July issue), we discussed a program geared to individuals who wished to become more involved in some in-depth discussions concerning homosexuality. We have recently learned that due to some unexpected delays, we will have to postpone this program until January. As news of this program's ability to operate becomes known the information will be made available to you. We hope this has not inconvenienced anyone unduly.

THE SEXUALITY OF SPORTS Do you remember the fuss that was raised over the issue of the Italian soccer coach telling his players that sexual abstinence would make them the victors in this year's World Cup? Or perhaps some of us remember the 1964 Japanese women's volleybally team that somehow managed to pass the year without any intimate contact with men. Following that same logic, it is often assumed in team sports that the absence of members of the opposite sex will miraculously result in no sexual activity occurring. Wake up people--this is the 1990's not the 1890's. In his book, The Arena of Masculinity. Sport, Homosexuality and the Meaning of Sex, author Brian Pronger discusses these and other issues as seen in the following quotation:

"One man bends over, while another from behind puts his hands between the inclined man's legs, grasps a ball that's shaped like a large testicle and attempts to throw it to another man.

Everybody wants the ball. Men along the line of scrimmage press themselves against each other enthusiastically. Then, as a man on the field runs with the ball, many others run after him, trying to grab him. The play climaxes with men lying on top of each other, the testicle-shaped ball forming the nucleus of this masculine clutch. When the time is up, the boys go back to the locker room, take their clothes off again and shower together."

The author states that he doesn't think that men who like sports are necessarily gay but that the "homoeroticisim of sport is a structural manifestation of our culture, a culture that has made men and women unequal, thereby making truly egalitarian relations between them virtually impossible." The author furthermore questions whether people think sport is truly a heterosexual world or whether by remaining silent, as in other areas, that they are confirming what we already secretly know to be true. This book, scheduled to be released in September, will be co-published by St. Martin's Press and Summerhill Press.
