

Hate hurts ...

It appears that we still have some work to do in terms of educating the masses on homosexuality. Evidently, a university education is also not an indicator of tolerance towards others. This in light of the fact that the 28th through the 30th of October was BGLAD (Bisexual, Gay, and Lesbian Awareness Days) at the University of Guelph shows us that such events are required more often. To what am I referring? A letter appeared in the October 22nd issue of The Ontarion, the student newspaper of the University of Guelph. It was written by a certain William Wu who despite what he says is severely homophobic. You be the judge. The letter is included hereafter in its entirety. Here it is:

On Wednesday October 9, 1991, the Federal Government of Canada and the Ministry of Defence commenced a nation wide acceptance of homosexuals into the Canadian Armed Forces. Until then, all homosexuals and any homosexual activity had been banned.

This is an objectionable maneuver by our Government, in our already declining state. The implications of this legislation is far more significant than the surface of the issue. Does this national decision imply the acceptance of gross sexual deviant activity, including bestiality and necrophilia? Are we condoning the act of sodomy? Are we allowing effeminate

soldiers to defend our country? This is an international embarrassment to our nation.

Our Federal Government is neglecting our biological obligation to reproduce from normal heterosexual relationships. This anti evolutionist position has the most detrimental effect on our environment. If we were to all irresponsibly conduct ourselves as promiscuous homosexuals, our species would be extinct within one generation. Canada would be much more progressive by funding and creating effective rehabilitation programs for these sick individuals.

No I'm not a gay basher and I'm not homophobic: I'm just a patriot who is very concerned about our national welfare and our continuation of species.



A two-day conference on lesbo/homophobia in the education system

Saturday November 9 and Sunday November 10, 1991

at The University of Guelph

About the conference

This conference will address issues pertinent to lesbians and gays who are in some way affected by lesbo/homophobia and heterosexism within the education system. The format will involve Panel Discussions and Workshops conducted by individuals drawn from the educational system. These discussions will be concluded by Plenary Discussions designed to formulate a working plan or proposal to help address our concerns.

Panel discussions will address a broad overview of homophobia, heterosexism, and lesbophobia, the experiences of lesbians and gays within the educational system and with homophobia, and lobbying the Ministry and Boards of Education.

Who should attend?

Any staff, faculty, students, members of school boards, administrators, or policy-makers who have been or are currently affected by lesbo/homophobia.
