

Some parting words



The Campus Closet

Life in the closet is for some a brief and innocuous experience. For many others, however, it can be the most brutalizing experience imaginable. But just what are the implications of life in the closet for those who pursue the avenues of higher learning? The paper, The Campus Closet, which was published by the Ontario Federation of Students (OFS) in June of 1991, looks in detail at this very issue as well as what it means to be out on campus. What follows is an overview of the general themes of the paper. If you wish to read the paper in its entirety, contact one of the GGLE executive members to either borrow it or to find out how you can acquire your personal copy. It is a document that all of us should consider having in our possession.

Homophobia on campus is something which we face daily. Posters that the GGLE has placed on designated boards have either been defaced or removed. At McMaster University, their main bookstore was forced to remove The Joy of Gay Sex and The Joy of Lesbian Sex from its shelves as a result of complaints from an anthropology professor who found them to be "two of the most disgusting books I've ever seen on sale anywhere." In Montreal a 23-year-old McGill University student and gay activist Joe Rose was attacked and killed on a bus in March of 1989 by a gang of 10 to 15 youths. While only a small sampling of homophobia on campus, the message is quite clear: It's not safe to be out on campus.

Lesbophobia is different from homophobia insofar that it is not a reaction by society that is simply based on sex. There often are few or no safe havens for lesbian students to go. And what is often worse, they are usually represented by gay males at speaking engagements on homophobia.

This has a tendency to reinforce the invisibility of lesbians. Lesbophobia also differs from homophobia in its manifestation of violence. Gay men are "bashed" while lesbians are bashed and raped.

The paper continues to discuss examples of homophobia and heterosexism at the college, the undergraduate, and the graduate levels. Specific references are also made to homophobia and residence life. Something that members of the GGLE should be pleased to hear is that the University of Guelph is the only university with a formal written policy that includes samesex couples in married student residence. Some of the strategies that are suggested in the paper to help raise awareness about the issues that concern us include: Nights Out or Kiss-ins; a large number of lesbians and gay males attend a straight event (i.e. a campus pub) and stage couples dancing together or kissing one another. Both events force the straight individual to confront their own homophobia. Other events include: 1. Awareness Week (i.e. BGLAD); 2. Gay Jeans Day; 3. Shock Posters: 4. House meetings (for student residents); and 5. Residence Surveys.

The paper concludes with five recommendations from the OFS: 1. Colleges and universities lacking a comprehensive policy on human rights should develop one; 2. New or updated human rights policies should be prominently publicized as part of job recruitment and any official publications; 3. Anti-discrimination workshops should be developed for all managers at the administrative and academic levels: 4. Orientation programs for new students should be developed to include issues surrounding homophobia and other forms of bigotry and prejudice; and 5. Establish safe places, for all individuals, that are non-racist, non-sexist, and non-homopho-

Wellington County Men's Survey

The ACGWC and the Guelph Gay & Lesbian Equality will be conducting an anonymous survey of gay/bisexual men and men who have sex with men in Guelph and Wellington County. This survey will be similar to other community-specific surveys conducted across the country, including one conducted by Hamilton AIDS Network for Dialogue and Support.

The proposed objectives of this survey are to: assess awareness of HIV/AIDS infection; assess awareness and perceived credibility of the ACGWC; assess availability and use of wellness resources/services; assess self-image and values of men who have sex with men; evaluate means of reaching out to this high-risk group in the county; provide useful data to assist the ACGWC plan its programmes for this group.

The Gay/Bisexual Men's Issues Committee is formulating the questionnaire for possible summer/fall distribution. The success of this survey will depend on word-of-mouth awareness and hand-to-hand distribution. Anonymity is guaranteed by a mail-back system. Please inform your friends/contacts, especially anyone you know in the county who engages in sex

with other men. We will require a large number of volunteers to help administer this survey. Please contact either the ACGWC or the GGLE for more information.

Gay/Bisexual Men's Issues Committee (GBMIC)

The GBMIC is a sub-committee that deals with HIV/AIDS-related issues of particular concern to gay/bisexual men, and has permanent representation on the AIDS Committee of Guelph and Wellington County (ACGWC) Board of Directors. Member of this committee, with the assistance of the Guelph Gay and Lesbian Equality, administered 20 questionnaires for the national Men's Survey '91, and also assisted the Education Committee in formulating a value statement on homophobia for use by the ACGWC.

The GBMIC is currently working on an awareness/needs survey of gay/bisexual men and men who have sex with men in Guelph and Wellington County (see Wellington County Men's Survey). The GBMIC will continue to be involved in the development and implementation of programmes relevant to the gay/bisexual community.

The core group consists of ten individuals, but many more volunteers will be needed for specific projects.
