

Justice for All

On March 4, 1986, the Federal Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada declared:

The government will take whatever measures are necessary to ensure that sexual orientation is prohibited ground of discrimination in relation to all areas of federal jurisdiction.

The federal government has lived up to their promise by taking no measure whatsoever.

In September 1991, Mr. Justice Joseph McDonald, Ontario Court, general division ruled that the federal human rights act violates the Charter by not including sexual orientation among the prohibited grounds for discrimination.

The federal government's response? In October 1991, Justice Minister Kim Campbell appealed the decision.

The federal government has stated that they will introduce amendments to the Canadian Human Rights Act in the near future. It is not clear whether they intend to include protection for lesbians and gay men.

Salut! Well, yes, I recently had the chance to spend a couple of days in Quebec City with some friends. And it only snowed once! Surprise, surprise. I had come prepared with mega snow gear and boots, but I only used the boots. My hosts, Scott and Rachel live in a nice apartment in the old quarter of the city (right outside the touristy area). By the way, it is as hilly as it seems! Scott picked me up from the train station and by the time we had walked up several huge hills carrying my (of course overpacked) luggage and got to their third floor apartment, I was exhausted! So much for being in shape! All triathletes out there—have I got a city pour toi!

Well, it being my first trip and all we naturally did quite a tour around the city. Saw the Plains of Abraham—virtually the only green space on the top of the hill. Apparently in the summer it's packed with sunbathers and yes—is a prime cruis-

ing area. That day, it was full of semisuicidal kids with crazy carpets. Watch out for the trees at the bottom! Walked around the old city reading inscriptions on statues etc., dodged Japanese tourists at the Chateau Frontenac and checked out a few old churches. We were going to go down the oldest street in North America by the dock but the wind-chill factor started to get to use. Home and tea called.

Oh you want to know about the bars? Yes, we did hit a few [Ed. note: I hope it didn't hurt.] I'd forgotten that the bars are open until 3 am. Going out at 1 am was a new experience! But once you get into the swing of it, it all seems quite reasonable. As far as I can gather there are three main gay bars in the city. One (men's bar) was closed for renovations when I was there so I only saw the "Ballon Rouge" (mostly men's) and the "Venus" (mostly women's) bars. Both bars have a coat check instead of a cover and conveniently both were close to my hosts' home in the old quarter (why not have your priorities set before you move to a new place?)! Now, I'm not a professional tourist so I don't have addresses for these bars but both are fairly well known. The Ballon Rouge is something of a city landmark—everyone knows where and what it is. It's quite large—upstairs and downstairs—two bars, an outdoor patio in the summer. The music can best be described as "Cock Rock" (I need not explain myself, right?). The quebecois also seem to be into lots of lights and lasers on the dance floor. Most of the men seemed quite confused by Rachel an myself-we'd get the initial checkout and

Rachel and I hit the Venus on the Saturday night. It's kinda a cross between the Rose, the Pink Zone, and the Robin's Nest. For those die-hard pool fanatics, yes it has a pool table. Dance floor about the same size as the Rose (small), mirrors and neon like the Pink Zone and the music was good, mostly danceable. Upstairs was where the older crowd hung out. They have a band and a not-so-good singer (I thought it was Karaoke night) on the weekend. In between sets it was a different version of the Nest—people doing the Continental and various dances to old 70s Quebecois songs that I'd never heard of. I quite liked it! But the best thing about being there

was that I actually felt TALL for once in my life. Shorter stature people take note: This is Your City. Taller people—if you like people smaller in height—this is also your place!

Well, what else to say about Quebec? I didn't suffer too much culture shock although it was damn frustrating to understand what people were saying on the buses but not be able to say something back. A knowledge of spoken French really does help. Most people do know English but prefer not to speak it. As summed up by one man at Ballon... "You're very beautiful, but learn to speak French ... but you're still beautiful." One last word—anyone considering going to Laval University? Where else can you attend an aerobics class where half of the movements are taken from a Ballon Rouge drag show? Salut!

No condoms for Quayle

U.S. Vice-President Dan Quayle is opposed to condom distribution in schools, but thanks to the Washington, D.C. chapter of ACT UP, his 16-year-old son, Tucker, can still practice safer sex.

Tucker and his classmates at the allmale Gonzaga College High School were recipients of condoms and safer-sex information on December 11, compliments of ACT UP, which targeted the school in the wake of comments made by the vicepresident criticizing Magic Johnson's promotion of safer sex rather than abstinence.

Although Tucker was whisked away by Secret Service agents before ACT UP could supply him with rubbers, Stephen Smith, a member of the direct action group, says several of Quayle's classmates promised to deliver the condoms to him personally.

"By squelching safe-sex education," Smith says, "the vice-president is promoting unsafe sex. We wanted to make sure that Tucker and his friends know how to protect themselves, because he obviously isn't getting safe-sex information at home or at school."

Fantasy spectacle to raise funds for AIDS

The event will be held on Sunday, May 31 at the Thirty-three MAC night-club in Guelph and will feature hair and fashion designs, dance, movement, and live music. It has a storyline and themes, including humour and spectacle.

Local hairstylist, Delaney and costume designer, Cheryl Crouse came up with the idea to do a fund-raiser for the AIDS Committee. It is the first of a series of events the two hope to stage. "Fantasy Majestic" will feature models from the Esprit School of Modelling, as well as volunteers.

Research

Below is a summary of safe-sex guidelines as formulated by a number of prominent AIDS groups. Because there is some controversy surrounding several of the activities, we urge you to keep informed about the latest developments in AIDS research.

Considered Safe:

Mutual Masturbation
Hugging, body rubbing
Massage
Social (dry) kissing
Fantasy
Light S&M (without bleeding or bruising)
Sex toys (when used only on yourself)

Considered Possibly Safe:

Anal or vaginal intercourse with a condom
French (wet) kissing
Sucking (but stopping before climax i.e. not ejaculating in partner's mouth)
Water sports (external)
Cunnilingus (oral sex performed on a female)

Considered Unsafe:

Swallowed semen
Anal or vaginal intercourse without a condom
Water sports in mouth or on skin with sores or cuts
Sharing intravenous needles
Fisting or rimming
Sharing enema equipment, douching equipment, or sex toys.
