CKCO-TV - Homophobia is alive and well in Kitchener

On Monday, June 8, I came home from a hard day at work expecting to sit down and relax in front of the TV while eating my dinner. As I sat there blankly watching everyone's favourite gameshow "Wheel of Fortune", at approximately 7:20 pm., CKCO aired one of their entertainment updates called "In Entertainment". These clips show brief interviews of Hollywood stars and entertainers. I was shocked and surprised when I saw that tonight's profile was on Anita Bryant. Yes - Anita's till around, and sadly for the gay community, still making news. As an aside, for those of us who came out in the late 1980's, Anita Bryant was (and still is) an outspoken, southern-american (can we spell Bible belt?), anti-gay advocate in the late seventies, early eighties. Although, apparently Anita had been used by her former husband to air his negative views on homosexuality, newly remarried Anita, as it seems, still can't keep her mouth shut.

But back to the interviews. The gist of it (such that I remember) went something like this. Anita explained how her opinions against homosexuality had caused her a great deal of persona stress. She had become very depressed several years ago and had almost committed suicide, but one thing had stopped her. She had met a young man who was dying of AIDS and who had renounced his homosexuality. Presumably, he had made peace with himself and this allowed Anita to

find peace within herself. This renouncing of one's homosexuality, according to Anita, was a recourse that many young people have taken, and can take. And so now, Anita Bryant had gone back to here career as an entertainer in the United States.

Well, naturally I was outranged and saw red. What the hell did this have to do with entertainment? and why are TV stations still giving credence to such a pathetic individual such as Anita Bryant? What really scared me was this occurred in KITCHENER - our own backyard! I immediately got on the phone and called the station. Although, at the time I was incensed and probably not as coherent as I would have liked, I managed to convey to the secretary that I was VERY displeased with their choice of programming and that they had alienated at least 10% of their viewing audience. She game me the name of the programming manager - Alan Brooks to speak to during business hours. Alan, incidental has been a difficult guy to get in touch with since.

I, unfortunately did not get a copy of the interview, but if anyone out there did, please let me know. As many of your know, I called around to members of the community to ask people to call and complain. Many of you did - Yeah! My Father is Coming - Literally?

Over the years, I've found Lesbian movies to be one of two types. Firstly, there are the straight portrayal of lesbians. That is, we are unable to get a manand hornier than hell. These lesbians are seen as being unstable, transparent and non-committal. Not to mention the fact that they are garbed in minimini-skirts and heels. Basic Instinct is a prime example. But My Father is Coming takes the cake for falsely portraying lesbian relationships.

This film has about as much pizzazz as Sunday afternoon television programming. Vicky, a young German woman living in New York is surprised by her father's visit, attempts to hide her gay lifestyle by pretending to be married to her gay roomate.

When her father arrives, he manages to score a spot in a commmercial (something his daughter had tired to do for years) as well as scoring big with a large breasted prostitue/actress. We are repeatedly tortured by having to view the two (throw-backs from the 70's) "fooling around". We even get a wonderful view of Vicki's dads' very little clothing (resembling a beached whale). He also swings from a man to a woman and back again in a state of disarray and confusion. She wanders aimlessly throughout the movie trying to get acting parts in films and never really present-

ing herself as gay, straight or bi. She's torn between two lovers. A transexual male and a possessive and jealous woman who is a short order cook in a local greasy spoon - wonderful portrayal.

I had wished I'd brought a pillow to the theatre, as when I wasn't grossed out by seeing the pale, fat dad doing it with Betty Boop, I could have caught some sleep. Now, I did state most lesbian movies were on of two types. Let me elaborate on the other, the B-Movie/Low Budget Film. Too often lesbian films are made on a shoe-string bud-

get, never doing well in the theatres, or mak-

ing it in the film and video world.

Just once I'd love to see a 1 or 2 star movie (comparable to Henry and June) that depicts lesbians as being "normal", and unlie the axeweilding Sharon Stone in *Basic Instinct* or the fonfused, feeble and vulnerable Helen Sharer or lead actress in *My Father is Coming*.

All you lesbian actresses I urge you to get out there and show them the real world of confident, secure, 90's lesbians, who don't just go for women because they can't get a man.

Finally, a small tip to all the male directors and producers who believe that creating this crap is going to win them an Oscar: lesbians prefer doc martins, birkenstocks to spike high-heels and mini-skirts. *Thanks anyways!*
