Digitized Files - JPEG Version: The JPEG version is of **lower quality** than the PDF version, but will generally be **faster to download** than the PDF version. The files are set so that each page image takes up the full height of your viewing window; increasing the height of your viewing window will increase the size of the text. If your Internet download speed is lower, then this is a better option than the PDF version.

Digitized Files - PDF Version: The PDF version is of **higher quality** than the JPEG version, but generally takes **longer to download** than the JPEG version. After the file is displayed, we suggest that you **set your viewing window as large as possible** and then **adjust the PDF magnification** so that the text can be read comfortably.

Telephone Numbers & Email Addresses: These documents were published many years ago. Please do **NOT** use them as a source for telephone numbers or email addresses for local businesses or agencies. SAN FRANSISCO RECOGNIZES GAY RELATIONSHIPS

On November 29 the San Fransisco Board of Supervisors officially recognized gay and lesbian relationships in a measure which says that "domestic partners" of city employees have the same status as married couples.

Under the law, two unmarried persons not related by blood may register with the city clerk as "domestic partners". The law would apply to straight as well as

gay couples.

The measure accords equal status to gay partners in such matters as visiting rights at county hospitals or jails, bereavement leave, equal consideration by the housing authority and equal coverage in the health

insurance program.

"San Fransisco is doing something extraordinarily significant. We are offering the world, which is having a difficult time dealing with changing relationships, a startling definition which says we should not make moral judgements when two human beings come to us and say they love one another," said Supervisor Harry Britt, who sponsored the legislation.

THE GAY COMMUNITY IN KITCHENER-WATERLOO, 1982

The following is a brief chronology of some highlights:

April 2 - K-W Gay Media Collective receives standard contract in the mail to rent Victoria Park Pavilion for a dance.

April 5 - After receiving a phone call from a city clerk denying the rental, Joe Szalai and Greg Meadows go to city council to demand access. Council approves rental when Meadows advises there is no connection between

the Media Collective and another gay group that seemed to have had problems. Council refuses Szalai's demand for a by-law prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

June 4 - Dance goes ahead with no incidents. Rumours of queer-bashers appearing because of the publicity

kept attendance low.

June 14 - Six delegations approach Kitchener city council asking for a by-law prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation as passed in Toronto, Windsor and Ottawa. Request is referred to civic administration committee.

June 26 - Gays of Wilfrid Laurier University is officially recognized as a student club after refusal

of their application in the spring.

July 19 - Recommendation of civic admin to pass the policy goes before council. Meadows asks that policy include city services and facilities as well as employment. The main motion covering employment is passed but a second motion offering protection for services and facilities is defeated.

July 20 - Szalai publicly protests anti-gay literature distributed in downtown Kitchener by Positive Parents of Canada. Stew Newton, head of the group, denies any attempt to influence upcoming municipal elections.

September 15-17 - GLOW sets up table in the Campus Centre during Orientation Week for students and announces plans in the Imprint, the student newspaper.

September 10 - GLOW Cabaret Night featuring entertainers and comedians from Toronto. Prompts critical review by

Lorna Warlow in the FM Times.

September 17 - A very successful dance is held at Bridgeport Community Centre for gay groups and the Coalition for Gay Rights in Ontario. There was a feeling that the old magic had been rekindled.

October 15 - Bridgeport happens again but Centre refuses

to rent to gay groups in the future.

November 3 - GLOW hosts concert by gay singer-songwriter Charlie Murphy and Jami Sieber.

November 8 - Joe Szalai runs as openly gay candidate in Ward One, Kitchener.

BOOK REVIEW

Coming Out Right by Wes Muchmore and William Hanson (Available at the GLOW Library or Glad Day Bookshop, 648A Yonge Street, Toronto.)

A wealth of practical information and advice for a man just entering the gay community. There are chapters on coming out to oneself and others, bars, baths, cruising, first loves and relationships, health care and the law.

This book should have been written years ago. In clear, simple prose authors talk about the problems of the "gay lifestyle" and the options open in dealing with them. The parts on health care and the law take into consideration problems all of us face as gay men but rarely talk about.

A Canadian version of this book would be much appreciated since much of the commentary on the law and social conditions differs from the state of affairs in the U.S.

Interest in the Coalition for Gay Rights in Ontario has dropped off markedly since the battle was lost last fall to include the phrase "sexual orientation" in the Ontario Human Rights Code as an area protected from discrimination - at least in the Toronto community.

Most of the groups outside Toronto, having big problems of their own, see the Coalition as a chance to share ideas and resources on a grass-roots, practical level. Over the next year GLOW hopes to add its voice in the process of making the organization relevant to local groups - such as in coordinating skills and forming positive attitudes that are desperately needed by many of the members.

CGRO is important to you as a GLOW member because there is much to be learned from the insights, struggles and success stories of gay communities across Ontario. There can be alot gained if we pull together in an organized fashion across Ontario rather than being narrowly local in fighting discrimination and the popular myths about gay life.
