

Imagine there's no countries, It isn't hard to do. Nothing to kill or die for, And no religion too. Imagine all the people Living life in peace.



# What is the "Hate-Free Zone"? By Rev. Anne Treadwell and Lyn McGinnis

Back in 1992. Rev. Marilyn Sewell. a Unitarian minister in Portland, Oregon, was trying to think of creative ways to fight an amendment to State law that would remove certain civil rights from gays and lesbians and would declare them perverse. Someone suggested they call a press conference and tie a ribbon around the entire block the church was in, declaring it a hate-free zone. As the whole block was Unitarian property, it could be done!

The usual thing for a minister to do is consult with a whole bunch of people before doing something that hasn't been done before. But Marilyn Sewell didn't go to her Board of Trustees for permission. She didn't go to her congregation. As she tells it, "I mean, what could anyone possibly say in opposition - [would they sayl 'I'm for hate?!'"

She just went ahead and did it. The press conference took place soon afterwards. A bunch of teenagers from a shelter for gueer kids whose parents had kicked them out climbed on ladders and wrapped the whole city block with waterproof, construction-quality ribbon. They also put signs up at various anchor points along the ribbon proclaiming, "Hate Free Zone" and "Hate Is Not A Family Value."

The media began to arrive, and a small crowd gathered. By chance, the Women's Alliance of the church was having a luncheon meeting, and when they heard what was going on they all trooped out and joined in. This group,

Rev. Sewell says, was composed mostly of elderly, 'proper-looking' women. Some of them were interviewed and their comments broadcast — think of the viewers wondering, "Can a respectable grandmother be wrong on an issue like this?"

This story was told two years ago by Rev. Anne Treadwell, of the First Unitarian Congregation of Waterloo. It was in way of a greeting to celebrants at the first Pride Day held on Roos Island in

> Victoria Park in Kitchener. (Our 5th Annual Annual Pride Day locally) Rev. Treadwell ended her story by saying:

"I'd like to think that today Roos Island has become, even if only for one day, a Hate Free Zone. As a quite respectable grandmother myself, I want to proclaim loudly that we can all be proud of who we are, whatever

our age, race, religion, gender or sexual orientation. I want to echo the words of Marilyn Sewell's speech that day in Portland, and help make them true in Kitchener-Waterloo, Guelph and all the surrounding area: "Here you are welcome, whether you are Jewish or Christian, Buddhist or Humanist, Atheist or Agnostic. Here you are welcome, whether you are Gay or Lesbian or Straight [or Bisexual or Transgender]. Here you will be treated with the full measure of respect and human dignity that every human being deserves."

Last year, along with repeating this story, members of this congregation decided to re-enact this symbolic event.

We unrolled similar caution tape and creating a huge circle that everyone held onto as we declared Roos Island a "Hate-Free Zone." This year members of First Unitarian Congregation of Waterloo are joined by members of the Guelph Unitarian Fellowship in creating a new dimension to this tradition. We have asked many organizations in our community to contribute decorated sections to be added to one large circle. We will create our circle to the song "Imagine," by John Lennon. This is also the theme of this year's Pride Day, "Imagine: Be a Dreamer!" We will say, (or sing) this song together as we pass the circle around so everyone can see all the contributed sections. Take a close look at all the contributed sections to our circle. They represent facets of your community, here to celebrate with you! We will then raise the circle up and declare Roos Island a Hate-Free Zone!

Next year, along with these and more organizational contributions, we hope many of you will simply turn up with your own decorations to add to this creation. It is our long-term plan to continue to build on this creative and affirming tradition by adding new elements for every Pride Day. We will welcome other innovations next year, including drumming and other musical accompaniment as we make this tradition more and more our own. If you have any suggestions for how this event can be improved, please contact a member of the Waterloo-Wellington Regional Pride Committee or The Voice Magazine.

We would ask everyone to remember any religious references have very painful memories for many of us. Because of this reality, the one thing we will discourage is any explicit religious reference during this event. We want our Hate-Free Zone to be equally affirming to those with a specific religious orientation and those who are happy, or unhappy, Atheists and Agnostics.

The persons involved from both Unitaran congregations are members of what is known as the Welcoming Congregation Program. This is a denominational initiative of ambitious adult education materials and other resources. It is meant to help a Unitarian congregation work through any residual homophobia and openly declare themselves to the larger community as welcoming to LGBT persons. While LGBT Unitarians are the initiators of this program, many straight friends have joined us to work towards the creation of a diverse, safe, accepting, and courageous place for us to gather and to go out to create a more inclusive and just society. Our congregations are an illustration of multiculturalism and a celebration of diversity. We are proud to be offering Pride Services on Sunday, June 10, in Waterloo and Guelph. LGBT and straight Unitarians look on this Hate-Free Zone event on Saturday, June 9, and the services on Sunday, June 10, as our contribution to Pride for all in Waterloo and Wellington Regions.

We hope those able to participate in either or both events will be affirmed in your own inherent worth and dignity and that they will contribute towards justice and compassion between us all.

# First Annual LGBT Pride Service at First Unitarian Congregation of Wloo


